Evening Study



Evening study is offered to 3rd, 5th and 6th Year students. Study will commence Monday, 2nd September and continue until Wednesday, 18th December.

1-4 Days €150; 5 days €190.

Payment is made through VSWare. Please print and retain the receipt in your school journal.

Payment must be made before students attend study. The Study Contract will be available at Induction in August.

Drop-in study is for 1st and 2nd Year students only. Students pay €3 on arrival. Monday to Thursday.

ENCOUNTER RETREAT

Encounter retreat is a wonderful experience for 5th years. It is a well supervised weekend where each student will look at the areas:

- How am I doing in my life right now?
- ♦ How am I in my relationships with family and friends?
- How is my relationship with God?



This coming year, Encounter will take place in Ballymacarbry Community Centre and the cost of the weekend is €50. This covers everything from bed to all meals and use of the facilities for the weekend. The first Encounter will take place in November 8th—9th and the second will take place on January 31st—February 1st. If your daughter wishes to go, she will need to bring in a deposit of €20 by Monday, September 9th and state which Encounter she wants to experience -November or January.

Money should be in an envelope with her name + tutor name on it and given it to Sr Mary or Miss Kinsella. She may pay the balance in instalments.

School Uniform

The School Uniform Policy is outlined in the Code of Behaviour section of the School Journal and will be fully implemented. Reminder... 1. White polo shirts are not allowed; 2. Skirts must be an adequate size to be worn at an appropriate length for school uniform; 3. Grey knee length socks OR mid grey tights; 4. Black runners/sport shoes are not allowed; 5. 

Holly wrote and delivered an impressive and thought-provoking speech on 'Empowerment of Women'. She won the Perpetual Mildred O'Brien Trophy, plus an Apple iPad and a prize worth €1,000 for the school.

To reach the final, Holly had passed through challenging local and regional heats. The competition was sponsored by HSBC and saw a total of 303 students from over 180 secondary schools around the country compete for a place in the final.

Lucy Brennan and Caragh Bolger from 2nd Year and their teacher joined 40 young coders from all over Europe in the EU Parliament to showcase their coding and technology skills, teaching MEPs how to write their first lines of code, and demonstrating projects which they had already created.

Both students were afforded the opportunity to speak in the Parliament, Lucy presented her scratch project called 'Piano Pal'. The project is about teaching

the basics of playing the piano. Caragh presented her project on 'How to make the world a better place' which is about the little things that make the world a better place.

WIT Computers for Schools

The advent of the new computer courses and the need for a high degree of computer literacy creates an increasing demand for high quality computing facilities at second level. The Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) Computers for Schools initiative aims to enable schools in Waterford to meet their growing IT demands. It is challenging to equip computer labs in schools on an ongoing basis. As part of this scheme Sun Life Financial recycled their 3-year-old computers. St. Angela's are delighted to have received 20 laptops under the scheme.

BT Young Scientist 2019

This year we had two successful entries to the BT Young Scientist Exhibition. Both groups used their TY Young Scientist module to help prepare their projects. Anna Duffin presented her project on "High Intensity Interval Training", while Deanna O' Brien and Rachael Walsh used their knowledge of camogie to research "The Optimal Hurley Length for Use In The Modern Game". The girls impressed so much at the Exhibition in January, that they were selected to present their findings to experts in Physical Education and Sports Science at the University of Limerick in May. They were two of only 27 projects from the BT Young Scientist selected to participate in this event, furthermore, Anna Duffin has been invited back by one of the University Professors to continue her research over the summer — we wish Anna the best of luck with this.

GREAT URSULINE BAKE OFF 2019

The 'Great Ursuline Bake Off', which has become an annual event, was a huge success again this year. The competition was open to all Transition year students. 


Sports News 2018-2019
